

Jae Estes Agnes of God Unique Show

This play can be summarized as a unique shaking performance. The small cast and close encounters of the audience being placed on the stage as opposed to in front of it, make this a different production than we've seen at Lindsey Wilson College (LWC) in a while.

Dr. Martha Livingston is a court-appointed psychiatrist sent to evaluate Sister Agnes, a young nun whose infant has been found strangled. With Agnes claiming a virgin conception and having no memory of giving birth, Livingston must distinguish between the lies and the nun's perceptionaltering faith. Complicating her investigation, Livingston continually clashes with the overbearing Mother Miriam Ruth, who insists that Livingston leave Agnes alone.

Sarah Wood playing Dr. Livingston had a compelling story telling ability taking us between her backstory, Agnes' memories (played by Susan Herrington), and her sessions with Agnes. The cast, that included Natiaha Sigurbjartsson as Mother Miriam Ruth, were able to almost flawlessly portray this story of mystery and heartbreak.

Wood, in her final performance at LWC can definitely say that it went out on a high note. She was practically flawless in portraying her concern for Agnes and her disdain for religious figures like Mother Ruth. Herrington and Sigurbjartsson are sure to keep impressing. Herrington, in the title role, showed how much a person can take mentally; really giving it her all in this performance. Sigurbjartsson was also a great choice for her role displaying a motherly concern for Agnes. To be frank there isn't much that I would change about this performance. However, while the more up close view of the play was great and opened up a whole new range for the actors I think less of a minimalist set would have been the perfect tie in. Overall, this show was a great way to conclude the performances for the Fall semester. The Lindsey Wilson Players of course have many more shows happening in the Spring.

have classical and cultural music in this program at least twice throughout the year.



Begley gallery features senior showcase

The Lucretia C. Begley Art Gallery opened a new exhibit featuring the work of Senior Isaac Coty, a graduating student in Art Majors Seminar.

The exhibit is entitled, 'Natural Clash,' and expressed the idea of human

emotion.

'Natural Clash' dictates "visual confrontation...a natural clash of elements and features," Coty said in his art statement.

He has an appreciation for contrast, which he emphasized within the paintings. Coty worked with contrast in colors, using colors and sometimes heavy linework to really bring a specific subject of the painting to life and to the forefront of the viwer's mind.

Also explained in Coty's art statement is how the clashing contrast of visual elements depicted within his work is very representatives of Coty's emotions and understanding, two extremes of thought and action coming together to reach a middle ground.

The seven piece exhibit

was completed using oil paint and features a number of images, ranging from skulls to depictions of the human form, to animal bones and glyphs.

Coty's 'Natural Clash' exhibit will run from Dec. 1 to Dec. 13.
